COURSE DESCRIPTION

Pentecostal Christianity is now over 100 years old, a fact that the first generation would have found astounding, given their passion for the immanent Return of the Lord Jesus Christ. It has changed and grown much over the century and is now a global movement of rich complexity and diversity. The spirituality, theology, liturgies, organizational dynamics and missional strategies have undergone considerable development.

We will examine the roots of the early Pentecostal movements and trace key milestones in history in order to have a context for understanding the future. We will explore current reflections and postulations on what 21st century Pentecostal communities may become.

Human actions in the present are rooted in conscious and unconscious assessments of the past and aspirations of the future. Our historical survey and contemporary analysis will assist Spirit-led coaches to catalyze change and increase impact in their clients. Coaching is both “old” and “new” – it is as old as catalytic leaders helping their charges find God’s transforming power and perfect will. It is as new as the current millennium with unique contemporary challenges. This course is all about the context for transformational living.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the D. Min. Program, participants will be able to expand their influence by growing into ministers who:

1. Grow in spiritual maturity
 - a. Deepen their historical and theological appreciation of the Pentecostal-Charismatic tradition, leading to a growing personal spirituality
 - b. Cultivate disciplines of self-leadership, which produce holistic health and integrity as a leader
 - c. Communicate the role of Spirit-empowered ministry for effective leadership
 - d. Integrate Pentecostal spirituality into the practice of the leadership arts

2. Demonstrate leadership competency
 - a. Exercise missional leadership through strategically implementing purpose, vision, and values
 - b. Acquire and effectively apply new knowledge and skills to the practice of ministry

- c. Develop leaders worth following – catalysts for transformation in individuals, organizations, and communities
 - d. Expand awareness of the implications of globalization within the overall ministry of the Church
3. Exhibit scholarly integration
 - a. Reflect upon and utilize the insights of both biblical and practical theology, as well as the social and behavioral sciences within their ministry context
 - b. Write high-quality academic papers that demonstrate the ability to integrate scholarship with the practice of ministry
 - c. Develop professional research and writing skills in order to provide an enduring service to the larger Church through the publication of a Professional Project, and further written contributions to the scholarly world
 4. Utilize ministry networks
 - a. Develop relational health through mutually beneficial long-term personal connections with other ministry professionals, creating support systems for sustained impact
 - b. Connect with resources for ongoing ministry enhancement

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Integrating Cognition, Character and Competencies. Upon completion of this course, students will demonstrate, through assignments, class interaction and personal reflection, the following:

1. Understanding of the key issues – past and present – that confront Pentecostal and Charismatic ministries
2. Familiarity with some of the thought leaders writing about Pentecostal issues.
3. Personal integration of community spirituality, theological reflection and leadership obligations, with a view to empowering excellent coaching
4. A maturing acceptance that change is expected and that effective leaders anticipate it and learn to rely on the work of the Holy Spirit to lead them and their organizations into a new chapter
5. Capabilities to coach will increase using the insights gained from the reading and reflections
6. Ability to cast vision for being a 21st century, globally-focused Pentecostal leader
7. Appreciation for the unity-in-diversity of Pentecostal-Charismatic Christianity

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- **PRE-SESSION READING AND REFLECTION**

- **Reading Reports (25 points each; 100 total):** For each book, the student will prepare a two-page, double-spaced Reading Report with the following: 1) Full bibliographic reference; 2) An affirmation that the book has been read; 3) Three key ideas/insights from the reading as well as an overall summary statement; 4) The value of the book to the student's understanding of Pentecostalism. These reports should be submitted together by email or brought to class.
- **Reflection Essay I (4-5 pages, 100 points):** From your reading and reflection, answer the following three questions: 1) What challenges face Pentecostals in the 21st century? 2) Why are Pentecostals uniquely positioned to make a positive impact in the coming decades? 3) What does it mean to be a "Spirit-filled" coach?

- **10-12 page Research Paper (100 points) due November 25:** “Back to the Future: How Early Pentecostal Movements and Current Trends Inform Present Pentecostal Leadership” There is great flexibility within the topic here. The aim is to assess the principles of Azusa Street (include McGee and Robeck’s diverse perspectives) and the trends of Miller, Patterson and Yong and the broader concerns of Drane with a view to understanding what will constitute healthy Pentecostal **Leadership** in the 21st century. Obviously exhaustive evaluation is not aim – integration of key ideas with application for communities and mission is the goal.

GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR EXCELLENT PAPERS

1. Prepare a detailed outline and discuss it with the instructor if helpful.
2. State your basic thesis clearly and concisely – tell the reader what you are going to say and how you are going to say it.
3. You are writing, not talking, so be concise and clear and avoid unnecessary repetition.
4. Keep paragraphs focused!
5. Once you introduce a person, use only their last name in successive allusions, unless there are two or more with the same last name or you sight a new work.
6. Use the ACTIVE voice and as few verbs of being (am, is, are, etc.) as possible.
7. Short, clear sentences are better than long, convoluted ones.
8. Use “I” sparingly, but avoid “we” and “you” and speak about others in the third person singular and plural.
9. **Always use gender-inclusive language except when referring to the Trinity.**
10. Avoid plagiarism and overuse of direct quotations. At this level, the writer’s analysis – yes, your insights – are the critical factor, with solid support from the sources.

11. PROOFREAD two ways: 1) Read it out loud once or twice and do the grammar/spell-check; and 2) have a colleague/friend read it for clarity. Submission of a page or two by email to the Instructor is welcome for feedback.
