COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide an overview of Islam from its early inception to the present time, with a broad treatment of the diversity of beliefs and practices within the Muslim world community in order to help the Christian worker recognize both difficulties and possibilities for evangelism.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

1. Trace the historical development of the early Muslim community and understand its influence upon contemporary Islam
2. Describe the belief system of Islam and recognize its hidden elements of mysticism and folk religion
3. Identify present trends within the Islamic community worldwide and understand their impact on Christian witness

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Read the first nineteen chapters of *The Qur'an* by Yusuf Ali and write a three-page review, expressing your impressions, both positive and negative.
2. Read the other four textbooks in their entirety and write a three-page critique for any three of them that summarizes the material and expresses your evaluation.

B. Session

1. Attend all sessions punctually, both morning and afternoon
2. Submit on the following day a one-page typewritten summary for each of the afternoon practicum sessions.

C. Post-Session

1. Complete and submit a take-home exam postmarked no later than **July 25, 2005**.
2. Write a 15-20 page typewritten paper on a topic dealing with some historical aspect of Islam, which is relevant for today with regard to Muslim-Christian relations. The

bibliography should include three Muslim authors. The topic for the paper must be approved by the instructor.
